Roots:

- a word part that carries meaning but cannot stand alone, it must be affixed to a prefix &/or suffix
- tract, port, sist, ject, act, form, rupt

Suffixes:

- a word part the comes after a root or base word
- it can carry meaning & typically determines the part of speech of a word
- -est, -ist, -able, -us, -ous, -ic, -ive, -ent, -ship
