

I can't believe it is November already! The school year is moving quickly. We have many wonderful events occurring at F.N. Brown each day, as I am sure your child has shared at home. Thanks to all of our FNB parents for the tremendous support given to our school programs on a daily basis. A strong home school partnership is critical in fostering a positive experience for all of our students. Also, thank you to the various parent volunteers for helping us provide all of the extras for our students.

#### **Report Cards – PLEASE NOTE**

Report cards will be issued to students in grades 1-4 on Monday, November 17<sup>th</sup>. All report cards will be accessed on-line via Genesis/parent portal. Parents may request to receive a hard copy of the report card in writing by sending the main office an email: adugan@veronaschools.org. All parents should have received the parent portal access information. If you have not received the information, please contact our main office.

#### **Conferences**

Parent-Teacher conferences are scheduled for November 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup>, and 20<sup>th</sup>. Each teacher will share your child's social and academic progress thus far. Teachers will also focus in on areas that are in need of growth during this school year. Please note that we will have a 12:30 dismissal on all three conference dates.

#### **Thanksgiving Feast**

We look forward to our annual feast on Wednesday, November 26<sup>th</sup> @ 11:30 AM. Thank you to our generous SCA for organizing and funding this special tradition that our students and staff truly enjoy. <u>Reminder</u>: We will have a 12:30 dismissal on Wednesday, November 26<sup>th</sup> and school will be closed on Thursday, November 27<sup>th</sup> and Friday, November 28<sup>th</sup> for the Thanksgiving holiday.

#### Math-A-Thon

This year, the F.N. Brown elementary students will be given the opportunity to participate in Math-A-Thon, an education-based fundraising program that benefits St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and its lifesaving work. We participated in the St. Jude Math-A-Thon two years ago and raised close to \$9,000.00. Math-A-Thon is an optional fundraiser that all students will have the opportunity to participate. The program is designed to teach our students the importance of helping others while they practice their math skills.

Grade level assemblies will be held for each grade level on Tuesday, November 11<sup>th</sup> to explain to the students about the fundraiser, what it involves, and the benefits of doing it. On this day, your child will receive a parent consent form and a Math Funbook. If your child chooses to be involved in the fundraiser, the provided consent form must be signed and returned to their teacher by Friday,

November 21, 2014. The students will then obtain sponsors such as family and friends to make donations either on a monetary amount per problem (example: 10 cents or 20 cents per math problem that is done and correct) or pledge a flat donation amount. We recommend that students do not go door-to-door to solicit sponsors. Parents need to be involved in the process of soliciting donations from family and friends. Students then complete their provided Math Funbook which is to be completed at home independently. Included in the book is an answer sheet near the back so parents can participate and help check answers. There is also a tally sheet so parents can add up your child's points. Students then collect and return pledges to their teacher by Friday, December 5, 2014. All profits and donations will be submitted to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital to help treat children with illnesses and cancers. Each participant will receive a certificate of appreciation and based upon the amount raised, there will be prizes given. Students will benefit from this fundraiser because not only will they raise money to help other children, but their math skills can be practiced in a fun and educational way.

Please look for additional information about the Math-A-Thon during the upcoming weeks. In the interim, you may contact any of the committee members if you have a question – Mr. Hill, Dr. Lanzo, Mrs. Pellegrino and Ms. Witter.

#### **Conflict Resolution**

Children in the early years are faced with a number of problems in a typical day. Learning to solve them is a desirable skill to teach children. Solving problems involves critical thinking, which carries over into academic areas as well.

#### What we are doing in school: Conflict Resolution

Our students are taught the "Win – Win Guidelines" at school.

- 1. Take time for cooling off if needed. Find alternative ways to express anger.
- 2. Each person states their feelings and the problem as they see it using "I Messages". No blaming, no name calling, no interrupting.
- 3. Each person states the problem as the other person sees it.
- 4. Each person says how they are responsible for the problem.
- 5. Brainstorm solutions together and choose a solution that satisfies both a Win/Win solution.
- 6. Affirm, forgive or thank your partner.

At F.N. Brown school we view problems as opportunities to learn. Helping your child solve problems increases his or her independence. Capable children solve problems effectively. Conflict Resolution began as a school initiative a couple of years ago at our school. We are very proud of our work up to this point and we are viewed as the district pioneers with this approach. A committee of staff members, representing each of the other elementary schools, is currently signed up for the Conflict Resolution training sponsored by the New Jersey State Bar Foundation. This is the same training that our school committee attended. The goal for the other elementary schools respectively. This is very exciting! FNB will continue to work on this initiative and implement the next phase focused on *Peer Mediation*.

Our Character Education committee spearheading the Conflict Resolution and Peer Mediation approaches is comprised of the following staff members: Mrs. Collins, Mr. Hill, Dr. Lanzo, Mrs. Tully, Mr. Waibel and Ms. Witter.

#### How home and school can continue to work together:

You can support problem solving at home by using the steps listed above with your child. In addition, you can help by giving your child space to solve his or her problems wherever possible. Acknowledge when you see your child effectively solving a problem and label it as such. When you allow your child to solve problems, you are communicating your confidence in his or her abilities and competence.

#### **Literacy Night for Parents**

On a closing note, thank you to those parents that attended our first district Literacy Night (K-4). It was a huge success! Over 200 parents joined us for a very informative evening. Numerous elementary teaching staff members and administrators volunteered their time researching, planning and presenting the various components of a balanced literacy approach. I had the pleasure of presenting background information focused on the Common Core State Standards (CCSS) and the upcoming standardized assessments - The Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC).

It is an honor and a pleasure to serve as your child's school principal. Enjoy the rest of fall!

#### ACTIVITIES AT F.N. BROWN SCHOOL

#### KINDERGARTEN – CATHERINE ORSINI & MICHELE STARANKA

What an extremely busy autumn it has been! Kindergarten began the month of October with a ride on the school bus to Turtle Back Zoo. Everyone had a great experience visiting with the animals and sharing their adventure with their new friends. The very next day marked F.N. Brown's Fall Festival. All the Kindergartners wandered around the school pumpkin patch choosing their favorite pumpkin and being very careful not to pull their stems off. Thank you S.C.A.!

This month in Math we have just completed work on counting, reading and writing numbers 0-5. In Writing Workshop, the children have been sharing personal narratives and drawing pictures of true stories with a beginning, middle and ending. Reading Workshop has just completed the Launching Unit. Both Reading and Writing are hand-in-hand in producing short stories and the skills involved in book making.

Throughout the month we have discussed what respect means within our homes and school. We will continue throughout the year to follow through with why rules are important and how to communicate with others in a respectful manner.

The F.N. Brown community celebrated Halloween with an all-school costume parade for children and parents. Class crafts and holiday parties were enjoyed throughout the day.

We all look forward to our Thanksgiving Feast next month. Turkey and stuffing and corn bread, oh my!

#### FIRST GRADE – ANNA COLLINS & ERICA MC KENNA

October has been quite a busy month for our first graders. They are now ready for the full day and have stopped asking, "when is it time to go home or how much longer until the day is over?" The adjustment has been made by most of them. We are trying to go outside as often as we can to get rid of some of their excess energy!

They have all enjoyed their very first Writer's Celebration as first graders. Each class got to read their first published piece to the other first grade class. Listening to others stories encourages speaking in front of others as well as help some write better or even try new topics. Both classes had a wonderful time sharing. They enjoyed using the light speed sound amplification systems as well! The next writing unit is on "Small Moments" where students will write with more detail about one given situation, feeling, time or memory. This is such an interesting time in writing to watch them progress as authors. The students begin to realize writing is a communication tool and is actually quite fun! Please help your child by reminding him or her of some of the wonderful experiences just from this past summer to jog their memories. Personal narratives are always so exciting for them to write and share. Some children have written these ideas down in their homework pad, which is a great idea.

In math we have finished a unit on subtraction and are starting a unit about five and ten relationships. Students need to have a firm handle on addition to be able to see the relationship to subtraction. Please review these concepts by looking over your child's daily math skill sheet. We have been focusing on math vocabulary in class as well as "key words" especially when it comes to word problems. Some vocabulary words you may hear your child use are: join, part-part-whole, addend, difference, equals, and many more.

In science, both first grade classes have finished up a unit on matter and have learned about the different types of matter such as: solids, liquids, and gases. They are learning to be scientists and by taking on that role they had to make predictions and really think about the outcome of some of the fun experiments that were done. These experiments really helped to spark their science curiosity.

Reading as a whole group as well as individuals has kept our reading time very interesting. The students love to choose their own reading materials. This acts as a motivation for some and a challenge for others. Students are being encouraged to read information that interests them as well as be assigned specific reading materials to learn a given skill. Reading using context clues, making predictions and using cause and effect have been taught to show what good readers do when reading.

In Fundations, the children have reviewed all 26 of the letter sounds as well as have reviewed the short vowel sounds. They have learned what a CVC word is and that in most cases the vowel in the middle makes a short vowel sound. Your child has also learned what a digraph is. If you do not know what a digraph is, please ask your child to see what they remember. Digraphs are: th, wh, sh, ch, and ck. All of the students learned that ck will only ever come at the end of a word after a short vowel sound. They also learned that wh will only come at the beginning of a word. There are lots of spelling "rules" that your child is learning to become an independent speller. This is a process and it does take time.

At home you can continue to help your child become an independent learner by asking him or her to make connections to their reading, remind them of the Golden Rules and remember to have patience. Thank you!

#### SECOND GRADE – MARIA GRAZIANO & NANCY HISCANO

We have had a fun start to fall in second grade! Our first trip was to The Morris Museum. The students enjoyed two programs: NJ Nature Walk and Prehistoric Earth. Students had the opportunity to explore the museum and take part in hands on activities based on the topics they learned. We all had fun being able to touch and explore genuine animal artifacts and fossils.

In Reading Workshop we have moved from our Launching Unit into a Fiction Unit. We will be learning about the different genres of fiction including- realistic fiction, fantasy fiction, and traditional literature (folktales). We continue to work on our stamina, confidence, fluency, and comprehension. We have read some great stories such as <u>Tony's Bread</u>, <u>Little Red Riding Hood- A New Fangled Prairie Tale</u>, and <u>A Sick Day for Amos McGee</u>. We have worked on our retelling skills after reading our own "just right" books. It is important to practice retelling while reading at home as well.

We are having a great time in Writing Workshop as we explore writing realistic fiction stories. The students have come up with characters just like themselves and are writing a story based on the fictional writing format: characters, setting, problem, and solution.

In Math we have just completed our review topics on addition, subtraction, strategies and word problems. Many students still need to practice their basic facts up to 20 for speed and accuracy. Please continue to review these facts at home often. We are currently working with equal groups by looking at repeated addition and arrays. After that, we will move on to Place Value to 100.

We continue to learn about Energy in Science. We have just completed the chapter on Light and Heat and we are moving on to Sound. We will learn about how sound travels, what causes sound, and different types of sounds. We will be conducting experiments to explore all of these concepts.

#### THIRD GRADE – MEGAN PELLEGRINO, KAREN SABATINO AND KIM SAVOLSKIS

The students are having a wonderful start to the year as they become more adjusted to third grade routines!

In Math, we have been working on adding and subtract within 1000 using strategies and algorithms based on place value, properties of operations, and the relationship between addition and subtraction. Students should continue to practice their addition and subtraction math facts nightly so that they are mastered. Multiplication is right around the corner!

Reading Workshop is currently focused on the Fiction genre. Students are developing an understanding of various forms, features, and purposes of fiction. They are reading and studying different types of fiction pieces including fantasy, traditional, and realistic fiction. The students' reading of fiction is enhanced by an understanding of the narrative structure, story elements, and themes associated with each particular type of fiction writing. Students are learning specific reading skills and strategies that will enable them to visualize, infer, identify the author's message, and engage with the texts they read.

Students should use their thinking stems when responding to reading and incorporate all of the elements of story in their reading responses.

Students are finalizing their first Narrative Writing assignment which is focused on the quality of writing. Incorporating their Grammar Usage and Mechanics (GUM) lessons, students are challenged with forming complete sentences, creating strong leads in their "seed" stories, using powerful vocabulary and strong verbs, demonstrating proper paragraphing, and using correct punctuation and capitalization. Emphasis is placed on self-editing and revising, as students review their work to create a cohesive narrative. We are proud of the strides the students have already made this year in Writing Workshop.

In Science, students are learning about how all living things are made of cells which are the basic structure of all living things. They will be able to identify and compare characteristics of living and nonliving things and describe parts of the cell. They will also be able to describe the life cycles of plants and animals at the completion of the unit. Reading skills in this unit focus on comparing and contrasting as well as sequencing the changes of living things (i.e., plant and animal life cycles). Students should continue to incorporate the reading skills of inference, visualizing, and questioning into this non-fiction subject area.

Social Studies lessons have been focused on Map Skills as students learn about the regions of the United States. Being able to identify the states within a particular region as well as being able to effectively use cardinal directions is critical to student understanding. This regions unit will pave the way for our next unit focused on Native Americans.

Although students have recently begun cursive handwriting, they should continue to practice legibility in both print and cursive across the subject areas. Please continue to emphasize the importance of writing carefully and double checking work with your child when they are through with an assignment. As the first marking period comes to a close, we look forward to seeing everyone for Parent Teacher conferences. We wish everyone a safe and healthy start to the holiday season!

#### FOURTH GRADE – MARY ANN FORCE & LOU WAIBEL

Readers of all ages are drawn to fiction and it very well be the genre that students are most likely to choose as they search their library or bookstore. Fiction encompasses many different types of stories – fantastical, magical, historical, mythological and realistic. Part of the magic in any unit of study is exposing students to possibilities within a genre. By reading and studying different types of fiction students will develop an understanding of various forms, features and purposes of fiction.

Writer's workshop is full under way. Students are growing in their repertoire of strategies. They are continuing to collect entries, which inspire them to create a story. They have been studying and creating leads and discovering how they can be a link to the heart of the story. Students are also sharing and conferencing with their peers becoming "writing teachers" Celebrations of stories has become a highlight enabling students to share their writings with pride.

In math, fourth graders have begun Topic 4. Students are learning how to use mental math to add or subtract, estimate sums and differences of whole numbers and subtracting across zeros. Students are also practicing how to solve multistep word problems posed with whole numbers using the four, including problems in which remainders must be interpreted.

Students are continuing to examine NJ's four regions and their specific characteristics. Their upcoming class trip to the Sterling Mineral Museum will have them travel through three of the four land regions of New Jersey. They have also began to find points on a map using latitude and longitude coordinates as well as practice other map reading skills.

In science students are concluding our study of understanding ecosystems. We discovered that ecosystems are complicated systems with many interactions among living and nonliving things. We also learned that human and natural forces can interact with ecosystems to cause changes. We are now in the midst of learning how energy transfers into ecosystems, the roles of living things and how they get their energy.

Our Peace Pal program is in full gear. #### **INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC – MAX MORDEN**

Our 4<sup>th</sup> grade band students have been hard at work learning how to hold their instruments, shape their mouths (embouchure), where to place their hands and fingers, and how to use their air. For all wind instruments, the students should not be puffing cheeks. If you see this, just give them a gentle reminder. Along with all that they must learn to read the letters (pitch) and the counts (rhythm). This is a very daunting task and the real key to success is following through at home. A short but *daily* practice routine is the most beneficial way for students to get better both more thoroughly and efficiently. Students are only asked to practice for 10 - 15 minutes a day, but it is the *every day* part that is crucial. A longer period of time on a couple of days is not only less helpful, it can actually be detrimental since beginning students don't have enough stamina to sustain a long practice session.

For our first concert, all students are working on these songs: *Hot Cross Buns, Au Claire de la Lune, Mary Had a Little Lamb, Lightly Row, Good King Wenceslas, & Jingle Bells.* Hopefully you are hearing (and recognizing) them often. We will also be having various solo and duet performances. As always the students are very excited and we look forward to our first performance. Dress is black pants or skirt, with a white shirt or blouse. Boys wear a tie of any style and design. Any shoes are acceptable.

#### <u>SPANISH – LUISA WITTER</u>

Hola de la clase de español! These past two months (septiembre y octubre), students have been learning a lot in Spanish and have transitioned nicely back into español for the year. First grade students all got a Spanish name this year that they will be using in Spanish class. First graders have been learning basic greetings in Spanish including being able to answer How are you in Spanish, What is your name, say Hello, Goodbye, etc. For Hispanic Heritage Month, students got to see different instruments from Spanish speaking countries and had the opportunity to play the instruments to Spanish merengue and salsa music. Students will be comparing and contrasting the holiday Halloween (Dia de las brujas) to Day of the Dead (Dia de los muertos) that is celebrated in México. The first graders are off to a wonderful start with their first year of Spanish!

Second grade students are practicing greetings but are building to their knowledge by having mini conversations with each other in Spanish using basic greetings such as Hello, What is your name, How are you, See you later, Goodbye, Good morning, etc. Whereas in first grade, students were expected to just be able to answer the questions in Spanish, second grade students are practicing to ask the questions as well to apply it to have a mini basic conversation with someone in Spanish. Students are beginning a unit of numbers. Second grade students will be learning numbers up to twenty through song, various class activities, games, and both verbal and written practice.

Third grade and fourth grade students started off the year by brainstorming ways of why Spanish is so important to know in today's society and how knowing Spanish could help them as an adult when they have their own jobs. They came up with some great answers! Students have been expanding their knowledge of greetings and have learned additional ways to greet someone and the differences between greeting someone who is around their age as opposed to greeting an adult. Students presented group dialogues in class and did a great job with them. It was a wonderful opportunity to get students to practice speaking en español! Third grade students are currently working on their Hispanic Heritage projects using boards on discovery education. It is a great way of incorporating technology into español. Based on information researched at home, students are presenting it using some basic Spanish sentences! It was a great project for them to realize that so many of their favorite artists, baseball players, singers, actors, football players, soccer players, are Spanish or who have a background of Spanish! In addition, it is a great opportunity to practice typing as well! Fourth grade students are working on a Hispanic Heritage Month scavenger hunt for them to realize how important the Spanish language is to our society. Some missions consisted of going to a Spanish restaurant and ordering Spanish food, interviewing someone who is Spanish, finding a river, state, or city that comes from a Spanish word in the United States, locating

signs locally that are in Spanish among many other missions! Fourth grade students also practiced the date, weather, and counting the number of days in school up to 100. Felicidades to the fourth grade students for doing a terrific job saying part of the announcements en español!

#### **READING INTERVENTION – KELLY FLYNN**
