Verona Values

Continued from last year is our focus on Positive Behavioral Supports in Schools (PBSIS). At Verona High School, we call our PBSIS, Verona Values. Our school's values of **Responsibility**, **Integrity**, and **Respect** function as <u>our core beliefs</u>. Throughout the school year, each student will have opportunities to earn Verona Value Cards when he or she is observed by a staff member doing something that embodies one or all of our core values. Although we try to identify all of the wonderful things our students are doing, we would love to have your help. Please let us know if you observe a student exhibiting one of these qualities so that we may recognize his or her effort. Throughout the school year, students who receive Verona Value cards will have a chance to earn a variety of amazing prizes. A school is a community, and we thank you for supporting our efforts to reward and reinforce positive behaviors.

VHS is going One-to-One with Chromebooks

For the first time ever at VHS, we will be 1:1 with technology by providing the opportunity for every student to have a school-issued Chromebook. Our 1:1 initiative is part of our school's mission to be a Future Ready School.

Starting in September 2019, students will have the option to take a school-issued Chromebook. Any student who decides to take a district-provided Chromebook, instead of using his or her own device, will be asked to accept the Chromebook Policy & Procedures Agreement and pay the insurance fee of \$30 for the school year.

It is an expectation that <u>all students</u> will have either a school-provided Chromebook or another personal device with similar capabilities. At VHS, this is important because all students will need to access Google Classroom and other educational software during the school day and for homework. For this reason, every student is required to have a personal computing device.

The school anticipates that Chromebooks will be distributed to students who want a district-provided device starting on **September 6, 2019**.

• Elissa Malespina: High School Librarian and Media Specialist

Mrs. Malespina comes to VHS with 17 years of experience in education. She started her career as a Social Studies and Special Education teacher. In her latest position, Ms. Malespina served as the librarian at Somerville Middle School, where she was responsible for a library program that served over 375 students. In Somerville, Mrs. Malespina transformed the library and added a makerspace. Additionally, she evolved the role of the librarian by partnering with educators to infuse technology into the curriculum. Prior to working in Somerville, Ms. Malespina was the Supervisor of Educational Technology, Media, Multimedia and 6-12 STEM for the Parsippany-Troy Hills School District, where she supervised a staff of over 20 librarians, computer teachers, and TV production teachers. Additionally, she was in charge of technology professional development for the staff in the district. Over the last 17 years, Ms. Malespina was fortunate to be nationally recognized for her work as a librarian, not only by receiving the Bammy Award by the Academy of Arts and Education as School Librarian of the year, but she was also a part of the 2013 NJASL Progressive School Librarian Program. This award recognizes innovative ideas presented by a library media specialist that enhance the life-long learning skills of students and infuse technology into the curriculum. Additionally, Ms. Malespina received an ISTE Making IT Happen Award, which identifies and rewards educational technology leaders for their commitment and innovation. She is featured in the School Sleuth Case of the Wired Classroom Documentary, which aired on PBS, as an example of a teacher who is a technology integration specialist. Growth is important to Ms. Malespina. Outside of the classroom, she has worked closely with teachers and librarians around the world on ways to infuse technology into the classroom. She speaks at numerous technology conferences including ISTE, Maker Faire, Escape, NJEA, NJASA Techspo and more. Ms. Malespina is the Past President for the ISTE Librarians Networks, serves as the NJ Future Ready Librarians Taskforce Chairperson, helped write the NJ Future Ready Librarians Framework, and speaks nationally on the Future Ready Librarians Movement. First Day of School & Back-to-School Night

Our first day of school for students will be on **Wednesday**, **September 4**, **2019**. There will be a delayed opening **(10:00 AM)** on September 4^{th} for students in grades 10-12.

The freshmen class is asked to arrive at school no later than 8:00 AM to participate in Freshmen Orientation, which will be run by our Peer Leaders. We encourage all freshmen to arrive by 7:45 AM if they wish to socialize with their classmates and enjoy a continental breakfast provided by our SCA. Each 9th-grade student is encouraged to bring a copy of his or her schedule on the first day of school. The schedule can be printed from the <u>Genesis Parent Portal</u>. We kindly ask that each student print **both** his or her <u>rotating bell schedule</u> (the schedule listing the classes in the A, B, C, & D day sequence) and his or her <u>list schedule</u> (the schedule listing the periods in the order of 1 through 8).

On the first day of school, each student will meet all of his or her teachers and attend all of his or her classes (Periods 1-8). Prior to the first period of the school day, students will be asked to report to homeroom. A student's homeroom assignment can be found on the student's schedule. If you cannot locate the homeroom number on the schedule, a homeroom list will be posted in the main lobby of the school for your student's convenience.
